INTRODUCING

DR. ANDREW HAYDON



The 2022 Medicare Class is delighted to welcome Dr. Andrew Haydon as the newest faculty member of the Medicare team. As a former Medicare student himself (2010 Medicare Class), Dr. Haydon has experienced firsthand the genuine impact that Medicare brings to patients, whether it is by helping seniors save money on their medications, reviewing their medications, or by providing proper care through health screenings and other services. Dr. Haydon expressed the profound influence that the Medicare program has had on his career and looks forward to joining the Medicare faculty to help underserved populations again.

Serving in the military as a flight medic for 13 years, Dr. Haydon brings forth a unique experience to the pharmacy table. He earned his Bachelor of Science in Biology with a minor in Chemistry from California State University, Chico in 2002 and went on to earn his PharmD from the University of the Pacific in 2012. Dr. Haydon joined the UOP faculty in 2020 and is currently the Director of Professional Programs, where he focuses on enhancing student success through experiential education.



LET'S GET TO KNOW MORE ABOUT DR. HAYDON:

How was your experience as a past Medicare student? How did it impact your professional career before joining the faculty?

"I think I was in the 4th Medicare class so I took the elective in 2010, so it was quite a while ago and the funny thing is at the time I didn't even realize that managed care pharmacy was even a thing. I just knew that when I left pharmacy school, Medicare was one of my favorite parts of pharmacy school: helping people save money, helping people understand their medications, doing health checks. Everything was built into one really cool clinic. So for the first few years after pharmacy school, I worked in compounding, in an independent pharmacy,

and moonlighted as a clinical pharmacist until I realized that you can do managed care for a living. I ultimately found myself working for a county health system in managed care as a managed care pharmacist and worked my way up to being the Director of Pharmacy and ended being there for 6 years. I think Medicare profoundly affected my career, whether I realized it or not. I never connected the dots until after a few years in the workforce. "

What do you most look forward to about joining the Medicare faculty?

"First and foremost, the mission of the group; there isn't a more honorable mission than making an effort to serve underserved populations. Whether that's in underserved communities or just seniors in general I think that's the thing I look forward to the most—being able to provide that genuine help to somebody that may not have another place to go. My parents have aged into Medicare since I was in pharmacy school. I have been able to help them through the system, knowing the intricacies and the technical side of it, even with the interface (Plan Finder Tool) is difficult. There's not a chance my parents could do it, let alone my grandparents. So, to be able to offer that help, that assistance that people need in order to not just select the right plan, but to be able to offer health benefits along with it, and services that make the person leave the health fair feeling better, and with a positive outlook for the year ahead when they select the right plan. We're able to get them the medications they need without breaking the bank."

What has been the most fulfilling aspect of being a pharmacist?

"The most fulfilling part of being a pharmacist is being able to help people and I've always throughout my career been complimented by patients because I can break things down into easy-to-understand tidbits. I always tell students in community IPPE or when I'm presenting that you've got to be able to speak in a way that people understand. If I start using medical jargon and I start speaking medical language that not everybody speaks, their eyes glaze over. Being able to speak in a way that patients understand and being able to genuinely help them so that when they walk away from the pharmacy counter or from a phone call or a meeting in managed care or a clinical setting, the patient leaves knowing something more about their health. That's really what being a pharmacist is about." What differences do you see in the way pharmacy school was structured when you were a student compared to how it is now?

"I think the fundamental changes are in the structure of the curriculum. When I was in school, we didn't have these ICS courses, everything wasn't integrated all together. You just sort of had a therapeutics class and you had a physiology class, and they were disconnected throughout the curriculum. I think that taking and tying these courses together and making students understand the basics of a disease state and then going on further to talk about the applied therapeutics is a pretty neat change to the structure of the curriculum itself. When it comes to my time, believe it or not, when I was in pharmacy school, we had actual books too. I know a lot of stuff has gone digital. We did have the ability to take notes on the computer, but I chose a lot of times to take notes on paper as much of a dinosaur as that makes me sound like. I think that the digital impact on the way that education is delivered at our school has changed dramatically. When I think of the Medicare Part D program, I think it's grown exponentially. I want to say when I was in the classroom, it was ~20 students, so just the class itself has grown pretty substantially with regard to the number of students, number of faculty, and as a result, the number of patients being served has grown proportionally as well.

You mentioned that you served in the military for a period of time. What has that experience taught you and how has it affected your pharmacy career?

"I actually served as a flight medic in the Air Force, which first and foremost exposed me to a lot of different parts of medicine that pharmacists don't necessarily always get exposed to. I think, for me, it helped me grow as a person, which helped me be a better clinician and actually serving in the military prior to going into pharmacy has helped with maturity too. I entered pharmacy school a number of years older than most of my classmates, which in my opinion made pharmacy school a little easier because I wasn't dealing with some of the other growing pains that other students were going through. From a career perspective, it did make me appreciate sort of a non-traditional career path within pharmacy. I could have never seen myself just standing at the counter at Walgreens filling prescriptions eight to ten hours a day, five days a week. There's nothing wrong with a career at Walgreens. There's a lot of people who love working in Walgreens. It just wasn't for me."

With many years of experience in various different pharmacy fields, what advice would you give to pharmacy students who are still trying to figure out what route they want to pursue?

"I like to tell students to explore and learn what's out there. If there are educational things or events that you can go to that teach you about a certain aspect of pharmacy, go and explore them. If I had done that in pharmacy school, if I had known about AMCP, maybe I could have saved myself a couple years of my career and entered managed care a little earlier. Go and learn. Then once you've learned and now have an idea of what you might like, go and experience it. I tell my Comm 2 IPPE classes, don't waste this experience, you might not think you can learn anything at a Walgreens but asking your preceptor about different aspects of it, maybe you like scheduling and doing the administrative side of it, maybe you like order input, maybe you really like insurance and you like to reconcile claims. That can happen in every single setting right, there's learning opportunities everywhere, so seeking those out and trying to get experiences in those areas of pharmacy that you think you might be interested in, is good in every way."

What do you do for fun?

"I'm very much an outdoorsy person, so we do a lot of hiking, biking, or camping. For our vacation this summer, we're going to hike Half Dome. We do a lot of camping because I restore old Volkswagen buses. I'm actually restoring an old '68 Volkswagen bus right now in the garage. I love old classic cars. I've got an old '68 Camaro convertible that I've restored over the years. Up until earlier this year, one of my favorite pastimes was hanging out with my dog Charlie who actually went to pharmacy school with me. He was my study partner, but he actually got cancer and unfortunately passed away a couple of months ago after almost 17 years, which was tough. But I'm definitely a dog person."



If you had to be part of a bike, what part would you be and why?

"If I had to be part of a bike, I would be the tires because that's sort of where all the action that is behind the scenes meets the surface of the road. It's the interface. I could have chosen the pedals, or the sprockets, or the chain, or anything. If you don't have tires, your bike is not going to run. So I've always liked being the sort of interface...the person in the program whether that's in managed care or whether it's teaching. Making the interface to students to help them learn, trying to forge forward and understand things. So as odd as that may sound, I choose a chunk of rubber on that bike."

What do you think makes the Medicare class a unique experience for students?

"There are a lot of things but I think it opens the door to potential interactions that students might not have in pharmacy school otherwise. How often would you have gone into the Medicare Plan Finder tool or met with a senior one on one? Or provided a screening service or MTM service to a patient that is not affiliated with the school? It really provides a unique opportunity for learning in that you're doing things that you wouldn't be doing otherwise. You provide a service that genuinely makes a difference. This gives you the opportunity to make a difference in the day to day life of an individual. So it's not just working as a team or as an individual student, but you're providing a service to somebody that genuinely makes their life better, so I think that's probably the most unique thing about it. It also opens your eyes to different career paths like managed care, ambulatory care, or some other route that you might not have considered or been exposed to."

MEDICARE 2021 STATISTICS

For the first time in our program's history, the 2021 Medicare class implemented a hybrid approach where both in-person and virtual events were provided to the community. The resumption of in-person events was cheered by many and patients were happy to receive the breadth of health screenings and services that were available while also interacting with the pharmacy students. However, to best accommodate the needs of our community, we did retain several virtual events which were necessary or desired by those who were assisted that lived outside our normal service area, had transportation or mobility difficulty, or did not feel comfortable venturing out. MENTORSHIP TO STUDENTS

Earlier this year, Irene Chia (then a 3rd year student) reached out with a suggestion to start a new initiative aimed at supporting current Medicare students. With an increasingly competitive marketplace for jobs, residencies and fellowships, the goal was to better position our students for future success. So, we thought of two opportunities that might benefit them:

1) CV review and Mock Interview with a Medicare pharmacist alumni who has experience in an area of interest to the student

2) Mentorship opportunity whereby the Medicare pharmacist alumni would routinely engage with the student to help guide and support them longitudinally.

We next reached out to Medicare pharmacist alumni to gauge their interest in participating in either of the aforementioned initiatives. In total, 67 pharmacists expressed their willingness to help out. A little about those pharmacists can be found on the following page.

And with that began six weeks of intensive planning for the CV review and mock interview in which, Irene was joined by fellow then 3rd years Emilia Abdollahian and Mai Her Thao, along with Drs. Patel and Ranson to:

- Send pharmacists suggested interview questions
- Schedule mock interview sessions that were conducted virtually between student/pharmacist pair



- Pertain logistical planning
- Pair interested students (based on expressed career pathway interest) with pharmacist alumni
- Collect students' CVs and send them to their assigned pharmacist ahead of the mock interview

MENTORSHIP - CV REVIEW AND MOCK INTERVIEW The first step was the CV review and mock interview portion. In total, 28 pairs of students/pharmacists participated in one of the four virtual sessions (see pairing list on next page). We were thrilled that we had at least one pharmacist from every eligible Medicare class (going all the way back to 2007), except 2014 (just saying), to assist us with the mentorship activities.

> On the day of the event, participants were provided an overview of the event's schedule, assigned to breakout rooms, mock interviews were conducted and students were then provided feedback on their interview session, their CV, and an open discussion was held. The event was well received by students and pharmacists alike!

> We hope to continue to build on this new initiative and will next role out a formal mentorship program early this summer. Stay tuned!
